<p>Key knowledge: Key people/places/events</p>		
<p>Castles were first built in England following William’s defeat of King Harold at the Battle of Hastings in 1066. I know that this is before the Great Fire of London (1666). We will order dates from earliest to latest on simple timelines to help us begin to understand a timeline of British history.</p> <p>There are many different ways that we can find out about the past including the Bayeux Tapestry which commemorates The Battle of Hastings.</p> <p>Skipton Castle was built in 1090. We can use this to recognise some differences between how people lived in the past and to how we live now.</p> <p>The Normans built the first proper castles to protect their new kingdom. William the Conqueror chose the sight for Windsor Castle in 1070 and it has been home to royalty for almost 1000 years.</p>		
<p>Links to previous learning: In reception children talk about past and present events in their own lives. In Year 1 they begin to understand how we find out about the past (Travel and Transport). They learn about significant individuals from the past (Nurses) and begin to show an understanding of historical terms (monarch, government, war, remembrance).</p>
